
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Why is so much innovative research happening in Israel?

This occurs more broadly in society, with children in school, soldiers in the army and in Israeli life in general. Another reason is that Israeli society it made up of diverse groups of immigrants with new approaches and new ideas. And the

primary reason Senor and Singer offer is Israel's need to protect itself from hostile neighbors and the need to be a step ahead of them in developing technologies for protection, fueling innovation and encouraging investment in research and development.
